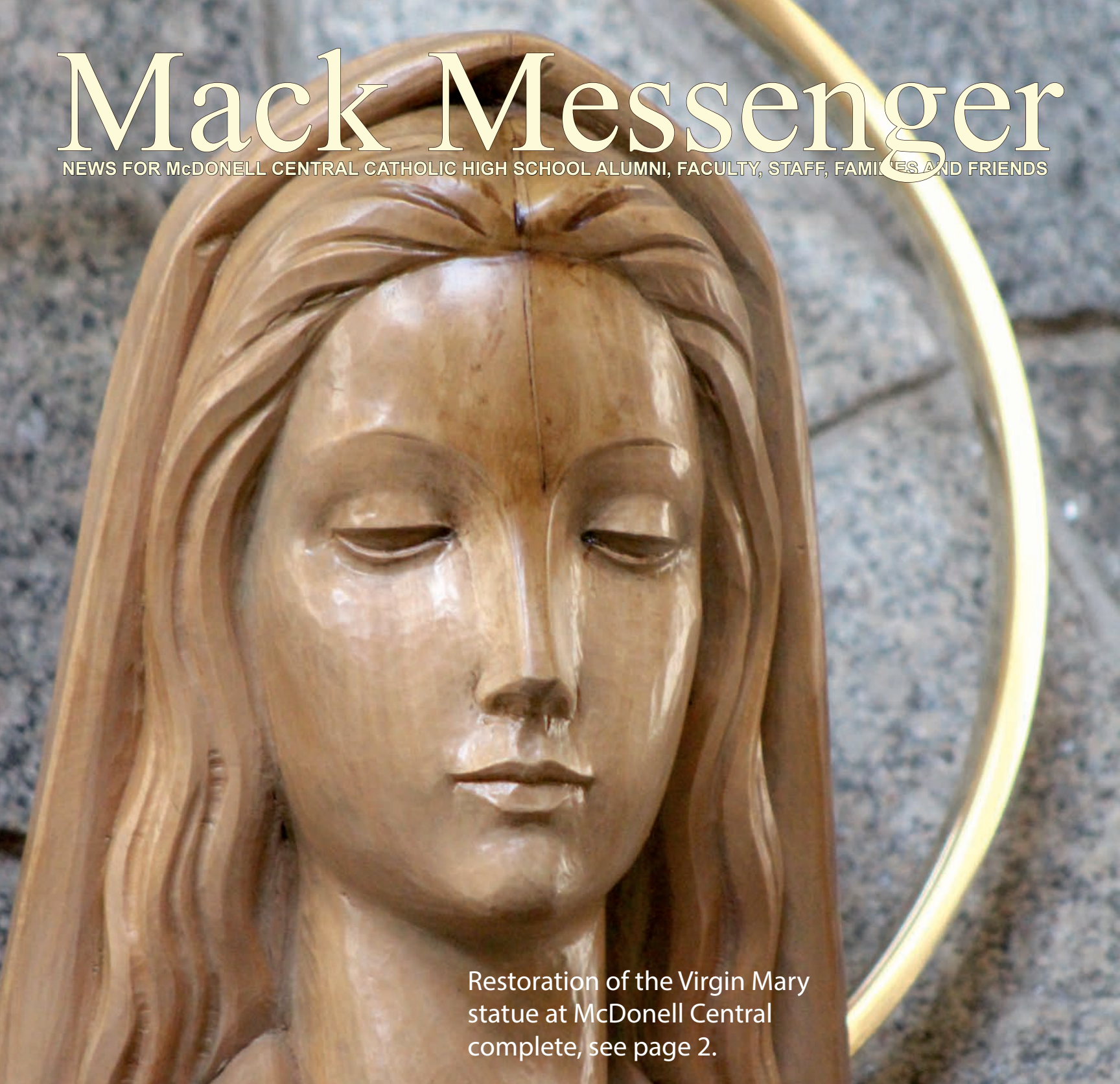

Letter from the President

Jeff Heinzen

Dear Staff, Families and Supporters;

What a year of highlights! We celebrated our 135 years of providing Catholic Education to the Chippewa area.

We saw new leadership with Mr. Brian Schulner, Principal of Notre Dame Middle School and McDonell Catholic Central High School and Mrs. Jaynee Brannen, Director of St. Charles Borromeo Early Childhood Center. In addition, we had Mrs. Ruthann Proue join us as our middle school/high school Counselor.

Mid-year Mrs. Mary Sue Briggs announced her resignation to move to Minneapolis with her husband, Bob, which led to us recruiting and securing Peter Samaranayake, PhD (Dr. Sam). He shared with us his organizational skills and realigned our elementary schedules so that teachers had common planning time and the school was able to reintroduce Spanish starting with the 2017/18 academic year.

The good news from this is that we had time to recruit and hire a new principal – Mrs. Kayla Bahhub. Kayla comes to us after two years as Dean of Students at Regis Catholic Schools. She brings to us her understanding of curriculum and assessment and a commitment to leading us forward as a Catholic educational system.

As I shared in last Spring's MACK Messenger, we received our AdvancED reaccreditation which then propelled us into strategic planning. In the Fall of 2016 we began a comprehensive listening session with our families, stakeholders and staff. Upon completion in early Spring we began the process of assembling the updated strategic plan. This strategic plan provides us a roadmap for academic rigor, facility improvement, growth of our extra-curricular programs, and faculty retention.

It takes many hands to help us be who we are - "[A] school of choice for an excellent Catholic faith based education... We welcome all families to be a part of our school community no matter their faith or financial means. In partnership with our parents, we form the whole child in support of our values and mission."

Now in my fourth year, I continue to find myself giving thanks to God for all of you who are part of the great MACS Family. I continue to pray for our families, graduates, alumni and staff and in a special way for the 2017-18 academic year. May it be filled with moments of grace and celebration. My door is always open and I value the input of all members of the MACS family.

May God continue to bless you and your families abundantly during the new academic year!

Restoration of statue at McDonell complete

For 53 years the statue of Our Lady has adorned the hallway near the chapel leading to the academic wing, and for the last three years or more the statue has commenced to crack.

Before it became irreparable, a committee of alumni and concerned supporters of MACS knew something had to be done quickly to restore the statue, but just what could be done and who could fix it was the main concern.

This beautiful hand carved statue was a gift from Father Robert Hanson, a former principal of McDonell.

The artist studied the site for the statue, which is the

With the statue restored the school is hoping funds can be raised to clean and seal the backdrop granite.

granite backdrop outside of the chapel. Specifications were then sent to Europe where the figure was carved from white maple. The image of the Blessed Virgin was deliberately made to look youthful to appeal to the students, but now the statue needed a lot more to gain back its appeal.

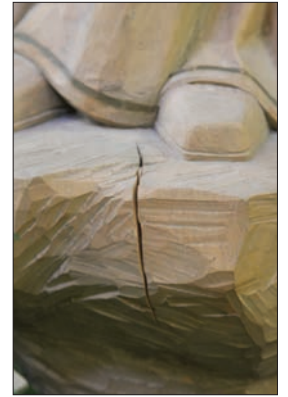
Fortunately, Mike Hanson, a former custodian at McDonell contacted Mike Padrutt, owner of Elm Grove Woodworks in Chippewa Falls. He was willing to take on the challenge this summer, promising to return the statue before the start of the 2017-18 school year. After removing the statue, it was found to be in worse shape than anticipated. It was not only cracked in two places in the front, but the statue had two large cracks in the back as well.

Because of years of exposure to a lot of dust and dirt, the statue needed extensive cleaning. Next, the repairs to the two joint separations on the back were done, and the front cracks were filled with small wedge-shaped strips of maple. Then several coats of lacquer mixed with a dye to match the original wood was applied. Finally, the brass halo, which was almost unnoticeable, was polished and lacquered to slow down the tarnishing. The statue should now need minimal cleaning and maintenance, keeping its present color and patina.

The image of the Blessed Mother is again a focal point in the corridor by the chapel. A special thank you to all who contributed to its restoration, especially Mike Padrutt. Let us praise Mary by proudly proclaiming; Mother most amiable, pray for us; Mother most admirable, pray for us; and especially since the restoration was a success; Mother of good counsel, pray for us!

Eagle Scout project benefits the Community Gardens

Trevor Opsal a Junior at McDonell Central Catholic High School and a member of the Boy Scout Troop 15 of Central Lutheran Church in Chippewa Falls built a 10'x10' garden shed for local gardeners to complete his Eagle Scout project. The shed is to be used by gardeners at the HSHS St. Joseph's Hospital's Community Gardens "To provide an easier and more efficient experience for them during the growing season", explains Trevor.

To start the project Trevor wrote a project proposal to the scout council in Eau Claire for approval that the garden shed would be worthy to earn the Eagle Badge. He attended a growers meeting to learn more about the community gardens and what the gardeners needed. He worked directly with Thomas Sahr, head of the food project at St. Joseph's, Joan Coffman, CEO of St. Joseph's, and Roger Elliot, overseer of the gardens. The project was finished in one and a half months and was celebrated with a ribbon cutting ceremony on September 11, 2017. Trevor shared, "I'm very happy how it turned out. It was worth the work and effort put into it and time commitment towards it."

Trevor, an aspiring pilot, says, "This project has taught me how to communicate better, be well organized and overall be a better leader." He thanks all who helped this project from donation of time, talent or money including all 18 family members, fellow scouts, and friends. 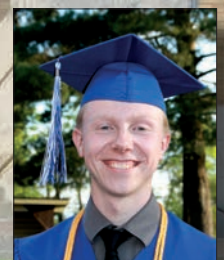

What are they doing now?

Nick Michels, McDonell Central Class of 1990 spies the world from lonely 153-foot perch above downtown Eau Claire as a crane operator. He is key to construction of the Confluence Arts Center in Eau Claire.

Nick Michels, 45, is a tower crane operator employed by Industrial Construction Specialists in Eau Claire, and chances are that once he climbs 153 handrails 153 feet up the tower crane, he won't descend until his work day is over.

He operates a Liebherr 320 crane with a load-carrying capacity of close to 14 tons, though he hasn't come across anything that heavy on this project yet. His job is to communicate with crewmen on the ground who secure loads onto the hook that Michels sends down.

"Without him, the project right now would come to a halt," said Justin Geissler, a project manager for Market & Johnson, which is handling construction of the \$45 million performing arts center. "He's an important part of that project."

The hook is attached to a trolley that Michels can pull toward him or send out along a jib, a 234-foot horizontal arm that extends in front of Michels' line of sight.

Michels' office is a 5-by-5-foot cabin that sits near the top of the crane tower that he climbs, and carefully inspects for any damage, daily. Inside the cab on either side of his operator chair is his trolley and hoist controls.

The view from up top doesn't impress him much anymore; the bird's-eye view of downtown Eau Claire, the horizon marked by a Banbury Place sign, brick buildings and tree lines and the confluence of the Eau Claire and Chippewa rivers have become something he's used to seeing. He's more preoccupied with the crewmen's and his own safety.

Occasionally he'll see something that catches his eye, and for a closer look he grabs his binoculars from a nearby shelf. The binoculars' main purpose is to help Michels see hand signals from men on the ground, another method they use to communicate.

Michels is one of about 70 certified tower crane operators affiliated with the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 139 in Wisconsin, said Dan Sperberg, training director at the Wisconsin Operating Engineers Training Center near Coloma, south of Stevens Point.

Sperberg said people who are successful at the job have excellent communication skills, can work well alone for extended periods and have good depth perception.

"People don't get promoted to that job unless they have amazing work ethic," Sperberg said.

With bricks built high around the large theater on the north side of the project site, Michels can't always see the load he's delivering or picking up, something called operating "in the blind." He can watch a computerized display to his left that reads out the weight of a load to get an idea of what he's picking up.

"Bring it left six feet, two, alright trolley in, line it down, looking good," an ironworker communicates over radio.

"Him saying 'looking good' means quite a bit," Michels said. "Everything I hear on the radio means quite a bit. When I hear silence, I don't know what's happening, so

I gotta stop operating. And that doesn't make it smooth. It makes (the crane) jerk and bounce and everything. It's not good."

He keeps busy all day and can haul up to 18 to 20 picks if he's working with the carpenters. If there's a lull in the action, Michels gets on the radio and calls to other divisions, informing them that the hook is free. Different divisions rent out the crane; however that time is shared among all workers, Michels said.

Michels doesn't have much spare time because he needs to keep a firm grip on the levers to avoid shutting off power

to the crane. His hands get sweaty, but he puts socks

over the levers to absorb the sweat.

Michels has been operating cranes since about 2005, getting certified through an apprenticeship that required 6,000 hours of training, which he completed over several winters at the training center near Coloma.

"Right from the beginning, he took his career very seriously," Sperberg said. "He was going to reach great heights."

While Michels said he was near the bottom of his McDonell High School class in terms of academics, he outshined fellow crane operator trainees when awards were handed out for performance.

"If you're interested in something, you pay attention," Michels said. "God willing, I will retire doing this."

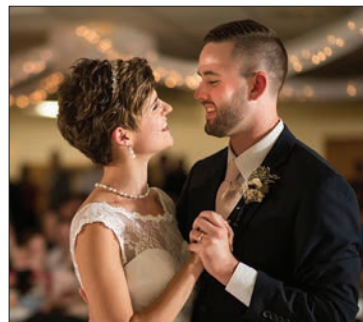
