Christendom today

I recently read a book entitled From Christendom to Apostolic Mission, published by the University of Mary in Bismarck, North Dakota in 2020. The book distinguishes between two different cultural ages that can exist in the life of the Church: Christendom and the apostolic age.

Christendom is when the culture largely aligns itself to the Gospel message. The Faith has influenced the key institutions of society and the maintenance of those institutions is the focus. Christian morality has taken root and is largely the presumed norm. In an apostolic age, however, the Gospel and the Church are not the predominant influencers in society. Christians will likely either encounter hostility or apathy from the prevailing culture. Suffering for the Faith and martyrdom is more common.

McDonell Area Catholic Schools was established in a Christendom time. Christendom culture in North America, however, has largely disappeared or is quickly on its way out. We see this in the health of so many of our parishes, the declining numbers of priests and religious, declining Mass attendance, the suppression of various religious freedoms

in society, and the general hostility present toward Catholic teaching and morality. This cultural change poses numerous, but not insurmountable, challenges for the accomplishment of the mission of our schools.

The book offers many pieces of advice for us living in a post-Christendom, now-apostolic age, and I'd recommend it to any of you. When considering the mission of our Catholic schools today, one key strategy is that we must all personally strive to adopt a more apostolic attitude, adopting Christ's call to "go and make disciples of all nations." As parents of children in our schools, teachers, and school leaders, we need to find renewed confidence in the goodness and truth of the Gospel message. Have we fully heard it, embraced it, and let it transform our lives, families, and worldview? Is our tie to the Church and our schools merely hereditary or sentimental? Or are we real believers wanting a life that is intentionally different from the rest of the world? "To be apostolic is more than to assent to a set of doctrinal truths or moral precepts, essential as they are; it is to experience daily the adventure that arises from the encounter with Christ; to view events and people moment by moment in the light of that vision..." The more each family in the MACS community embraces the apostolic attitude as a family, the more our schools will be a transforming leaven for the truth and beauty of the Gospel in our local community in this apostolic age.

In education, we often discuss the "climate and culture" of a school. In a Catholic school, a related but richer concept is that of "charism," which encompasses a school's special gifts, particular spirit, and identity inspired by the Holy Spirit. Charism is the foundation of mission and vision and is

lived out through a school's culture. With that in mind, what is MACS' charism?

I have reflected upon our school's past, present, and future to help answer this question. First, I think of our patroness, whose generosity is proclaimed in her canticle: "My soul magnifies the Lord." Throughout our history, generosity has been a common theme. Our founder, the pioneer priest Rev. Charles F.X. Goldsmith, gave his entire adult life in service to this community. Our namesake A.B. McDonell showed generosity through his gift to build and endow McDonell

Memorial High School in 1907. Examples of generous service have continued over the years, especially through our dedicated faculty and volunteers.

More recently, I think of charitable giving and works of mercy that are a regular part of our lives at the schools. For example, our school responded to the invasion of Ukraine through a day of prayer for peace followed by a day of giving in support of refugees. As we look to the future, the Holy Spirit is leading us to connect our relationship with God to living lives of virtue, especially through the charism of generosity. Think of the shape of the cross: the vertical axis points to our relationship with God, while the horizontal axis represents our arms extended in authentic love of neighbor. God is the source of our gifts and He will never be outdone in generosity.



I am certain many of you have heard me say that I retired once six years ago and that lasted 24 hours and 50 minutes. That's actually true. After 14 years of teaching and 20 years as a principal I decided to call it a career and go ride my horse. Then I saw a job posting for McDonell and thought I'd throw my hat in. I guess I figured it would be like a semi-retirement, running a school half the size of my previous school with a bunch of Catholic kids. All I would have to do is polish their halos each day. That's where I learned rule #1: Kids are kids no matter the religion.

The best way to sum up the past six years is to reflect on what I have witnessed in regards to the overall mission and vision of McDonell Area Catholic Schools. The best part of my job is that I had a front row seat to witness our students' success and our teachers' passion and dedication playing out not only in the classroom but as citizens of our community.

I was told once years ago, by a school superintendent, that I would never make a good superintendent because I put too much faith in my staff. My response to that was, "Multi million dollar buildings, athletic facilities, and technology does not teach the students. It takes a teacher to open a student's mind. Give me a teacher who can engage students and all they need is the shade of an oak tree to allow education to take place. It doesn't take bricks and mortar." We all know that Catholic school teachers are compensated much less than our public school counterparts. I have witnessed three specific instructors in the high school who have given forty or more years of service each to this school system. They have a passion for their subjects, a connection with students, and a candle that glows brightly for the teaching profession. Give me a dedicated group of teachers and the sky is the limit.

I am very impressed with the leadership of our students. I can't count the number of clothing, diaper, and relief efforts our students have been involved in. You don't find many schools who have an organized group of student ambassadors who

welcome the call of those in need. The most recent, of course, is the Ukraine relief effort. It was inspiring to watch as our students, parents, and community rallied around people we don't even know, to aid in relieving their suffering and needs.

Our Catholic faith is our foundation that is the glue that holds our community together. We celebrate who we are in prayer, Mass, practicing the virtues, and walking in the shoes of Jesus Christ. Whether a family here is Catholic or not, it's what you sign up for and Catholic is what you are going to get.

Our students are very academically prepared. I'm a data hound and I can remember being at an Education Commission meeting where there was a lot of negativity. "Do you really not know how good you have it?" I exclaimed. Our ACT average is two full points over the state average. Compared to surrounding schools we are even better. Also, 95% of McDonell Graduates go on to technical schools, universities, or military service. Before coming to this school I thought 60% was very good. Finally, 100% of the average GPA per graduating class is 3.25 and above.

A person once mentioned to me that it must be nice to be at a school where you can recruit athletic talent. I stated, "Yeah, our starting five for our state tournament bound boy's basketball team have been together here at MACS since kindergarten. Those recruiters sure know how to pick them." In just the six years I've been at McDonell I am impressed with the number of state tournament runs our girls and boys have had in basketball, cross-country, volleyball, soccer, track & field, and softball. There is something special.

An old African proverb states, "It takes a village to raise a child." I am constantly impressed by the turnout and involvement of parents in every facet from athletics, musical productions, relief efforts, and special events. While there may be disagreements at times, the main focus is always on what is best for the children.

Thank you to everyone for allowing me the privilege to be your principal the past six years. Blessings and Happy Trails,

from IT Coordinator Josh McCormick **TECH Corner**

This year has been an exciting year of upgrades and advancements for the Technology Department. Our first major update was replacing our core network switches. This project has been on the horizon for two years, and is a major improvement to our network. The new switches provide redundancy and increase our bandwidth on the network to handle more devices and network traffic. The new switches will allow us to scale up our network, and will be a great pairing with our next major project, replacing our main server.

We are expected to replace our aging server this summer. The current server is over 10 years old and getting outdated, while running out of resources to efficiently run our network. We are planning on implementing a new three node hyper converged

Server. This allows all three nodes to work in tandem, and if one node goes down, the other two will take over instantaneously, with virtually no network down time or lost data. Our new server will also include a new backup system, which will keep our information safe and secure. Our Server project will provide more storage, better backups of our data, provide redundancy and increased security to keep MACS online and secure.

We are also excited about the progress on our plan of replacing all of our projector style SmartBoards with Promethean interactive panels. The majority of classroom projectors are near end of life, and as the year progresses, more have started failing and started to degrade. The new Promethean boards will be a major upgrade from the current projectors and will allow for more functionality in the classroom, better visibility for the students, and have a longer life expectancy. New Promethean boards have been ordered for every classroom K-12. We plan to start installing them as they arrive as early as this spring, with complete installation by the start of the 2022-23 school year. We currently have 11 Promethean boards installed, and with positive feedback from the teachers.

We are continuously evaluating and reviewing needs for new student Chromebooks and teacher devices, such as laptops, both of which are due for a refresh. The Technology Department is very excited about the upgrades taking place, and excited about what lies ahead, keeping the MACS system up-to-date with the latest educational technology.

Bringing the Cinderella Musical to the Stage

Cinderella was truly a "must not miss" musical. This Rodgers & Hammerstein version of Cinderella was a broadway version of the fairy tale we all know and love. This cast was bigger than ever with 60 students involved! McDonell theater productions are on another level, with students taking great ownership in their work. There is high school theater, then there is McDonell Central Catholic High School theater, blowing the standard out of the water.

The costume department must get notable credit for this particular performance. In the past it has been primarly operated by experienced seamstress volunteers. However, this year it was taken over entirely by students with Senior, Helen Bullard as the costume director. The students banded together and put in countless hours making costumes that went above and beyond the crowd's expectations. Cinderella's dresses were especially a sight to behold as they transformed before the audience's very eyes as she twirled on stage!

The stage crew also did an amazing job beating a time crunch to finish the set design that helped bring the musical to life. With their efforts they were able to bring the audience to the living room of Cinderella's step-mother, to the Prince's dance hall, and to the town's square.

The McDonell theater is an exceptional example of the MACS values in action. With students putting their efforts in

with full gusto, helping each other make something great for their community's entertainment and joy, learning about theater, putting faith in the process and each other, and taking leadership of their efforts. Once you come to a McDonell musical, you will be looking forward to the next theatrical performance our students have to offer.

coach. Overall, with all he has done over the years for both his students and his colleagues, he has come to be known as one of the wisest mentors to walk these halls.


Amongst students Mr. Roesler has become legendary. The students, and many parents and colleagues who may have had Mr. Roesler as a teacher during their time as a student at McDonell, refer to Mr. Steve Roesler as Sir. This nickname caught on when an international student from Egypt in 1986 had difficulties pronouncing "Roesler" and, being from a culture which was very formal towards mentors, the student referred to him with the title "Sir." Soon this title caught

on amongst all the students as the perfect nickname for the esteemed Mr. Roesler, and for the past 36 years he has gone by the name. "It's a great nickname. How good do our students look when we're out in public and they address me by 'Sir'?" Steve continued, "It's a great PR move for the whole school."

Sir's classes are just as famous as the teacher behind them as Sir holds his students and athletes to a high standard of conduct and doesn't want them to settle for any less of themselves. "If you have to go to the bathroom, go before class or hold it, you don't

want to miss any information," said Senior Sydney

Flanagan. "He has a multiple, multiple choice system on his tests that will trick you. It is also vital that you do all your homework and that you follow 'Roesler's Rules' to get your 30 extra credit points at the end of the quarter." Sir went on to explain his expectations for his classes with two quotes that he has

posted at the front of his classroom. The first quote is "It's better to aim high and miss than aim low and hit." The second quote is "Attitude determines altitude."

Over the years, the memories of his first years at McDonell and the struggles as a new teacher have faded. However, he quickly realized in the beginning of his teaching career that it was vital to make connections with the kids. He was able to make these connections in his own unique way. It is clear that his efforts have made an impact with the students as

he is very beloved, despite the challenges of his classes. "This is the part of the job that keeps me coming back and it is the part of the job that I will miss the most, "Sir had to say about his connections with the students. "If you have a job you love you don't work a day in your life, and that's how I feel about my job working with the kids."

When asked how his faith has impacted his work Sir said, "You can't separate the two. MACS and my colleagues have taught me to be giving, loving, and faith filled. It's a big reason why I'm here."

Sir's career as a coach came about as a happy accident starting off as an assistant football coach. In 1979, he became the head track coach. Eventually, he came to be involved in volleyball as he came to marry a fellow teacher by the name of Deb Friermood, who was a volleyball coach herself during her time teaching at McDonell. Over the years football and track coaching has fallen from Sir's plate, but volleyball has stayed as a constant passion Sir has carried with him since meeting his late wife Deb. "I have kept this passion especially close to


me since Debbie's death in 2003," Sir said.

"In 1976 there were five of us that came to MACS as new teachers," Sir explained. One of these teachers was Deb Friermood. In 1980, Steve and Deb were married and in 1982 they had their first child. Sir credits Deb with a large part of making him the person he has become, as well as building the culture of the school. In 2004, Deb Roesler was named an honorary alumna and in the spring of 2019 the McDonell gym was named the Steve and Deb Roesler Gymnasium. "I want everyone to know how much it means to me that both Debbie and myself were nominated to become honorary alumni and the gymnasium was named after us," said Sir. The Roesler family have truly become an icon of MACS with not just Steve and Deb having left their mark on the school, but their daughters Kari and Kathy "Kat" also picking up the torch of teaching and coaching at MACS.

Sir, thank you for everything you have done for MACS. You are a symbol of aspiration for our school system and a class act that will never be beat. We'll see you at the games.

When the war in Ukraine began on February 24, 2022 it was unclear what the MACS community could do other than pray for the innocent lives caught in the violence. However, prayer quickly led to action when Ukrainian born, founder of Chalice of Mercy, Valentyna Pavsyukova needed help collecting donations to pay for the shuttling of Ukrainian refugees fleeing their country and a location to collect donations of clothes, medical supplies, food, and other basic needs for the Ukrainian refugees.

Following a day of prayer on Ash Wednesday, MACS requested donations by having a spirit day. All MACS students (K-12) and staff wore the colors of the Ukrainian flag and gathered money to donate to Chalice of Mercy's cause. In that single day, MACS was able to raise over \$8,000.

Soon after came the ask from Chalice of Mercy to use McDonell Central Catholic High School as a collection site for donated goods. With no time to think of logistics and storage space, MACS took a leap of faith and happily accepted the honor to help. Soon truckloads of donations filled the school commons and the Steve and Deb Roesler Gymnasium. Volunteers came in droves to help organize and package the items. By March 17, Chalice of Mercy was able to ship three semi-truck loads full of much needed donations to the people of Ukraine.

Jeff Hartman is a 1986 grad who was a four-year letterman in track and a two-year letterman in football. Jeff currently holds the McDonell school record in the 100- and 200-meter dashes. In his senior year, Jeff won individual state titles in the 100-, 200-, and 400-meter dashes while leading McDonell to a team state championship.

Eric Monarski is a 1992 grad, a three-time All-Conference basketball player and two-time All-Conference pick in football. This sharp shooter scored 1,260 career points and helped McDonell win its first-ever conference title in boys basketball. In football Eric led the state in receiving yards as the tight end in his junior and senior year. He went on to a successful college basketball career at UW-Barron County and also spent six years as a coach at McDonell

Bob Rooney has twice earned All-State recognition in basketball. The 1965 grad was an All-American Honorable Mention after scoring an average 25.5 points per game and nabbing 19 rebounds per game as a senior.
