From the Dean

A Need for Eucharistic Revival

On April 20, just a couple of weeks following Easter, our Chippewa Falls Catholic parishes hosted speaker Chris Carstens at the new St. Charles Fellowship Hall to speak on his book, *A Devotional Journey Into the Mass*. I hope some

of you reading this were able to attend and found Chris' talk helpful in coming to appreciate and entering more fully into the celebration of the Mass.

If you notice greater attention given to the Mass and the Eucharist in preaching or in other avenues in your parish, or in various Catholic communications, it's probably not a coincidence. Last summer, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops initiated a period of Eucharistic Revival that would last for three years. Why? Because we need it! With declining Mass attendance and recent surveys revealing significant lack of faith that Christ is truly present in the Eucharist, we need to renew and revive what we as Catholics know to be true. This truth is the source and summit of our Christian life. The Church's public worship in the Mass and reception of the Eucharist is key to what keeps us alive spiritually in His Church as the Lord established. It is the place and time in which heaven comes down to earth, where Christ's sacrifice on the cross is re-presented at the altar, and we come to offer our whole life, our joys, our pains, and sufferings, in union with Christ on the

cross. We then receive Him in return. Consider how you are being called to grow in this time of Eucharistic Revival. How will you grow in intimacy with God? How will you grow in your understanding and appreciation of the Church's sacred liturgy? How will you cultivate a personal love and amazement for the Eucharistic Jesus? Perhaps it is as simple as getting to confession or recommitting to getting your family to Mass every Sunday. Perhaps it is by signing up for an hour of adoration at the Goldsmith Adoration Chapel, or taking part in adoration when it is offered at your parish. How about doing some good spiritual reading, like Chris Carsten's book, or other resources that help us better understand the Church's liturgy?

Regardless of where you are in your Eucharistic faith, making a step and striving to grow in that faith is making a step for the whole Church. As each of us and our families grow in love for the Lord and His Eucharistic Presence, the whole Church is impacted, and so is the world.

McDonell Students plan a "reverse mission" trip to Casa Hogar

This won't be your typical mission trip. A dozen upperclassmen and adults will be heading to Peru in March 2024 during Holy Week to visit Casa Hogar Juan Pablo II. Casa Hogar is a mission of the Diocese of La Crosse founded by Servant of God Joseph Walijewski and currently led by Msgr. Joseph Hirsch. Visiting Casa Hogar will give our students and adult chaperones the opportunity to experience life with the 64 children living there. This is our first trip to Casa Hogar in more than eight years. As we prepare for the trip, we recall Msgr. Hirsch's visit to McDonell this last Fall where he talked about "reverse mission." The goal of the trip isn't to go and change their lives with a project we will work on. The goal is to go to Casa Hogar to experience life with them, have our own transformation, and bring what we have learned in

how to love and care for others back to our families, school, and community. The students who will be attending went through an application process and shared why they want to go on this mission trip, but also some of their fears. As we prepare for the trip, our group will spend time in prayer and formation so we are more docile to the Holy Spirit working in our lives and hearts and open to what God wants to share with us while we are in Peru. We will also be sharing with our community more about our trip and how others can support us before and during the trip. 

MACS Introduces Little Macks PreK

MACS introduced to the Chippewa Valley community a new option for a PreK with a faith-based, whole-child curriculum. The drive behind privatizing our preschool is our belief that God and the young children have a unique relationship with one another. That relationship should be assisted by the adult, but directed by the Spirit of God. St. Charles Little Macks provides children with a place to foster the growth of their relationship with God through tangible, but indirect means.

Little Macks Preschool serves children for 3-year-old-Kindergarten (3K) and 4-year-old-Kindergarten (4K). Both of our Little Macks PreK programs offer focus on early literacy, enrichment activities, outdoor exploration, and spiritual life through the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program (see article below).

On January 18, 2023, MACS hosted an open house with a Little Macks

information presentation, announcing the new program and inviting people to enroll. Nearly 50 families were welcomed at the door and directed to the St. Charles Gymnasium where MACS President Molly Bushman and Elementary Principal Jerry Smith spoke on the program.

"We have worked hard to ensure this program will not only provide the highest guality faith-based programming in line with our K-12 programs, but will also be affordable," said President Bushman. "The primary reason we are making this change is our mission: we will

> be able to bring Jesus to our 4K classroom through daily prayer, bible stories, and virtue formation.

We will provide the best possible foundation for our children to grow and thrive."

After the introduction, Monsignor Gorman blessed the 4K and Catechesis



The 4K teacher Angie Steinmetz and para Alysia Liddell Steiger '87 were introduced with a tour of the 4K and wrap-around classrooms. The night ended with a Q&A. Please pray for our Little Macks!

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

New to the MACS team is Kassandra Klinkhammer, the Lead Catechist for our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

program. Recently, Kassandra and her son David joined us for an episode of our Mack Chat Podcast to expand on this great program. This Catechesis of the Good Shepherd parish program started in the basement of the St. Charles Borromeo Church, but was invited to operate from MACS Early Childhood building. This arrangement was one of the driving factors that inspired the privatization of our PreK programs that resulted in the birth of the Little Macks PreK curriculum.


Kassandra explains that the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is "a Montessori based Catechesis for ages 3-5." What this means is



the program uses child-led education that allows the child to "learn to pray, learn to listen for the Good Shepherd's Voice,

> and ponder the Mysteries of the Faith deeper." This program uses a hands-on approach that immerses children in the Mass and the bible. They are told less and shown more. Students are allowed to wonder about the teachings of the Lord. Teachers are not there to instruct, but to be a "co-wonderer."

Children naturally ask questions, and often these questions are undervalued. The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd sees great value in these questions and encourages children to truly explore their wonderings. Thus, learning about Christ and all he has to teach us becomes a joy and an exciting exploration. Learn more at cqsusa.org.

A story of a generational MACS family and how they give back to our schools with their time and talent

"Each and every day our schools depend on volunteers, like you, to ensure that we operate efficiently and successfully," reads a line from the introduction of the MACS volunteer handbook. As exciting as a four-page handbook can be, we decided to ask one of our MACS families to elaborate on what donating their time to our schools means to them and how it has, and continues, to affect their time as a part of the MACS community. Recently, three generations of the Rubenzer family, Blake, Ashley, and Becky, joined us for a Mack Chat podcast to tell us their volunteer story.

Blake is a fifth generation MACS student, currently in second grade. Blake's mother, Ashley, is a fourth generation MACS alumna and Becky's late husband, Tom, was a third generation MACS alumnus. Both Becky and Ashley agree that volunteering has played a prominent role in their time in the MACS community. Throughout the generations, being involved in the school beyond the capacity as students and parents, has given them a deep connection and appreciation for MACS, and the family and Catholic values of the school system.

Ashley Meinen Rubenzer '08 began volunteering at MACS as a member of the Home and School Association (HandS). Soon after, she began volunteering in other roles as well. Nowadays she volunteers as a Parent Ambassador, in the St. Charles school library, as an occasional substitute teacher, and recently as a MAXX basketball club member. "Growing up [at MACS] I saw all the parent involvement and realized that MACS needs parents to step up and volunteer to make everything work. It's been a fun role to step into and I enjoy seeing the friends and the kids at school doing the day to day things that you otherwise wouldn't get to be involved in," said Ashley, volunteer extraordinaire.

When asked about the 30-hour volunteer requirement for all MACS families, Ashley assured us that those 30 hours go by very quickly over the school year. Not only are there many parent clubs to get involved in, but there are many odd jobs that parents can do that add up as well. Making baked goods or crafts for school events and volunteering at the school events, that parents would likely already be attending, are prime examples.

One of the many perks of being a MACS volunteer is undoubtedly getting to know the MACS community. This is especially true and useful for new MACS families who otherwise may not know anyone. Ashley commented that volunteering at MACS has also been helpful in getting to know her childrens' friends. This helps her feel more connected to her children and understand them better when they recount the school day.

Long time volunteer, Becky Rubenzer, began her MACS volunteer career when her children were young and attended MACS. Through volunteering at MACS, Becky was able to get hands-on experience and learn new life skills. "I began by volunteering in the grade school [working] with my children and that's how I learned how to use a computer."

"I used to volunteer in the [high school) library," Becky told us. Not too long ago while at an event, Becky was recognized by a former MACS student. "She came up to me and said, 'Hey I recognize you. You were our school librarian.' I just thought that it was so cool that there were [alumni] that still

remembered me. It made me feel good."

Today Becky can often be found in the Central Office volunteering for the MACS Scrip Program, which she has been volunteering for since its beginning. In a separate conversation, she told us, "I love volunteering [for the Scrip Program] because it feels good to help and I get to see and keep in touch with so many of my friends." Becky volunteers so often, her grandchildren have started asking where her office is. Who knows, maybe Blake Rubenzer will take over the Scrip program when he grows up and may even take over President Molly Bushman's office.

Coordinator, Kathleen Adams, had this to say about our MACS volunteers; "We are truly blessed with the ministry of our volunteers that support MACS. Supporting Growth of Our Schools through Growth in Advancement






