From the Dean Very Reverend Jesse Burish



Catholic Education - Forming the whole person

One of the great works of the Church up and down the centuries is education, and not just teaching religion, but a broad range of subjects - the liberal arts, the sciences. The Catholic approach has always been to form the whole person – in order that one be better

equipped to receive the Gospel message of the Church and become a true disciple of Christ. What can happen easily today, however, when we think about Catholic education, is that we can lose sight of what is of primary importance for what is secondary.

When we began the pastoral planning process for our city parishes and schools, our consultants surveyed the parents of MACS students. I, along with our school leaders and the other pastors, were a little disappointed in the response that our parents gave in the survey when it asked what their top reasons were for choosing MACS. Parents had 17 different possible reasons to choose from. The top two reasons parents selected were "competent and qualified faculty" and "academic excellence." Don't get me wrong. Those aren't

bad reasons for choosing MACS, and I'm glad our schools are strong in those areas. What was disheartening was that "Catholic faith formation" rated only 11th as a motivating reason for parents sending their kids to MACS. May we not forget that "Catholic faith formation" is in fact the primary reason our schools exist, and all the other reasons are built on that.

Of course, this response from our parents is not so much a problem with how well our schools teach the Faith to our students (actually, I think we do this pretty well), but more a reflection of where our area Catholic adults are at in terms of their own life of faith and discipleship. My point here is to encourage and challenge all our parents and families, all teachers, coaches and staff to seek to grow as real disciples. Are we striving to completely conform our lives to Christ and his Church? That conversion, after all, is what leads to real freedom and happiness. MACS and all Catholic schools are most successful in accomplishing their primary purpose when there is a whole "culture" of Faith. All of us are called to build up that culture by first answering our own individual call to holiness and to be a disciple of Christ.

Catholic Liberal Arts Education

Let's take a moment to focus on the first pillar of a MACS education: the MIND. We often tend to speak about this pillar in terms of test scores and post-graduation statistics. Today, I want to go deeper and explain the true value of a Catholic Liberal Arts (CLA) education from MACS.

The liberal arts have really gotten a bad rap lately, so it may seem like an odd time for MACS to reaffirm its identity as a Catholic Liberal Arts school system. However, by embracing this identity, we are actually on the cutting edge of a movement that is revolutionizing education. We are educating the critical thinkers that employers want, the citizens that this country needs, and the saints that will not only live for God in this life, but hope to be with Him in the next. This is the promise and vision of a Catholic Liberal Arts education and we aim for nothing less.

MACS students are enriched with education in literature. art, music, history and the sciences. We understand the

importance of early literacy and have specialists trained in the science of reading, which aligns to our knowledge-rich curriculum. Our goal is to incorporate truth, beauty, and goodness within the classical approach known as the Trivium: grammar, logic, and rhetoric. In this model, students gain knowledge through wonder, gain understanding through critical thinking, and learn to communicate with wisdom. Of course, MACS students also have opportunities for courses in biomedical sciences, engineering, vocational skills, and advanced placement in a variety of subjects.

Thanks to the efforts of Dean of Academics and Accreditation, Mary Huffcutt, we are partnering with the University of Dallas Classical Education Graduate program for our teachers' professional development to ensure student success. In addition, we are a member school of the Institute for Catholic Liberal Education. Their website is a great resource for more information about CLA education.







Our Lady of Prayer

McDonell Central Catholic High School is now the home of an original icon depicting Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. Uniquely, it is a Western image in the Eastern Style of Iconography.

In a prayerful posture, she is standing on the four corners of the earth, representing the altar where she is bringing us, to the Eucharist, to her son.

Our Lady has the traditional three stars (forehead and shoulders) representing her virginity before, during, and after the birth of Christ. The red and white stripe around the halo are the Alpha and the Omega. The color of her blue cloak is unique and represents heaven, while the red

underneath the white represents earth, which means she is a creature clothed in the divine.

The icon was commissioned for MACS with donor support. It was written by Mary K. Gwidt of Petra, 153 Art Studio and delivered to the school on May 28, 2021. It was blessed by the school's Chaplain Rev. Ethan Hokamp on the Assumption of Mary, August 15, at the Church of Notre Dame. He concelebrated Mass with the Very Rev. Jesse Burish, Chippewa Falls Dean. Currently, it hangs in the vestibule at McDonell Central Catholic High School.

Prayer cards were printed with the Memorare prayer on the back. Patron of our school system, Our Lady of Prayer, pray for us.



Louanne Baier, MACS Unsung Hero

Louanne Bresina Baier was raised in Tilden and grew up with the "Tilden Tigers" baseball diamond in the backyard. Local teams played there every Sunday through the summer. This instilled a lifelong love of baseball.

She graduated from McDonell in 1964, the last class from McDonell Memorial High School, now home of the Heyde Center for the Arts. She is at the school without fail every Tuesday and Thursday to help prepare lunch for the students. It has been 5 hours a day, 10 hours a week, and 10 years of volunteering.

Deacon Dan Rider, head of food service said "Her kitchen skills are much appreciated, especially when specialty items, like potato dumplings are needed."

Louanne's cooking talents, her down-to-earth style, hearty laugh, and cookies have made "Grandma

Baier" a favorite of both students and staff.





Following her speech Choral Director Mark Neppl asked the seniors to join the McDonell Concert Choir one last time in song,


> sharing with all present "Mama Mia Medlev".

The McDonell Memorial High School experience in 1963

Saturday evening, February 23, 1963, McDonell's state debate championship team, John Hanson, Judy Bowe, Betty Jenneman, John Thornton, and their coach, Father Jeremiah Cashman, found themselves surprised as they rolled down Bridge Street in a convertible, top down, horn blowing, proudly waving their trophy as a crowd of over 200 spectators loudly cheered them on. From Bridge Street, the parade made its way to McDonell Memorial High School on the east hill. Once there, they went into the gym where they were greeted by a cheering crowd of fellow students, parents, teachers, school staff, and Principal Very Reverend Robert Hansen. After the cheerleaders delivered their victory yell, Father Hansen stepped forward and declared his pride, the pride of McDonell, and the pride of Chippewa Falls, in the debate team's success. Team member, John Hanson, stepped forward and presented the trophy to the principal and the school. The year 1963 marked the first time in 29 years that a school in Chippewa Falls had brought home the gold for such a championship as this (Herald-Telegram).

Now, in 2021, MACS President Molly Meinen Bushman '98 had the honor and privilege of talking with former debate team member, now Principal of the Beveridge & Diamond Environmental Law Firm in Washington D.C., John Hanson.

Throughout his time at McDonell Memorial High School he was part of the student council, the Rotary Club, football

team, Lettermen's Club, the Choral Club, the debate team, and so much more. When asked why he was involved in so many extracurriculars he stated "even back then McDonell was considered a small school... We had a real David and Goliath attitude that we took into our various competitions with other schools. This attitude was something that encouraged you to participate in everything you had time for and had an interest in, to make sure the school life was as vibrant as possible."

John was especially fond of the debate team and attributes much of his success in debate, his professional development, and his career in law to his debate coaches. Once on the debate team John found his coaches' enthusiasm and passion for the art of debate to be in

passion for the art of debate to be infectious. In his freshman year, the debate coach was Mr. Jim Schafer '57.

In John's sophomore to senior year, the debate coach was Mr. Andre LeTendre. Both coaches were volunteers and each of them showed a true passion for what they were teaching. This passionate display of volunteerism went on to influence the young lives of not just John, but all his fellow teammates as well. "If it weren't for those volunteers. things would have been a lot different for me," stated John as he reflected on his time in debate. "Look at the consequences of their

volunteerism...not just for me but for the other members of our debate team that benefited[.] Judith Bowe went on to become a community leader in local government[.] Betty Jenneman went on to a life as a successful lawyer in the cities[.] Clearly the skills we learned in debate helped all of us in life."

John testified to the importance of debate, not just as a club and how it helped him and his teammates, but as a set of skills to learn and develop. "There is an art to speaking to the public that you learn in forensics and debate that helps students go out in life and speak in all settings of public spaces," says John. Debate goes beyond public speaking and communicating an idea to people. John explained that in debate, not only was he able to develop his skills in public speaking, he also developed good research skills, learned to think from multiple perspectives, to form well thought out and informed opinions, and to always respect the opposing opinion. John especially

John remarked at how much things have changed and evolved in such a short time. From how people used to dress and how students used to carry their books, to how class and research for schoolwork was conducted. Gone are the school uniforms for girls and the everyday suits for boys. No longer do students carry their books without the invention of backpacks. So long to the arduous library study sessions going through library index cards.

put an emphasis on the importance of learning how to research and respecting other legitimate, differing opinions, stating "each of us is entitled to our own opinion, but none of us are entitled to our own facts....we need to continually check ourselves about what we understand the facts to be."

Recently John Hanson made a generous donation to the school through our Witness the Difference Capacity Campaign (see inside back cover). With his generosity, MACS plans to "reboot" its forensics program for high school students. MACS is hoping this will offer students a way to learn many of the same skills John and his teammates were able to use in their

professional lives. Participating students will learn to develop a philosophical mind, approaching matters logically, with well thought out opinions, and good oratory skills.

John shared with us his advice for current McDonell students, "Keep your friends close and keep your mind open." John emphasized that next to family, friends often times will do the most for you to help you throughout life. He also advocated for students to keep their mind open by reading widely on all sorts of topics from all points of view, by thinking critically about all things, and by always making an effort to speak about one's differences respectfully.

Before parting John assured us, while many things may have changed since he was a student in 1963, two things have always remained the same, "Olson's Ice Cream is still the best place for a treat, and the MACS spirit withstands the test of time."

Gifts like John's help ensure the McDonell Central Catholic High School experience will continue for decades to come.



MACS had an average tuition increase of 3.7% for the 2020-21 fiscal year. However, the net increase seen by many families was closer to 2%, because we eliminated a technology fee and some other fees as part of our strategy to reduce fees.

Thank you to all alumni, parishioners and businesses that supported MACS in 2020-21. Your generosity has enabled MACS to keep tuition affordable.

Families who belong to a supporting parish and meet the criteria for active supporting parish member qualify for the supporting parish assisted tuition. Financial assistance is available for all families based on need. MACS participates in the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program and the Special Needs Scholarship Program.

Finance Reports Charts

The Financial Report reflects MACS's financials for the 2020-21 fiscal year. The pie charts show what was received and expensed in the various categories for the year 2020-2021. MACS finished the year with operating revenues of \$5,608,068 and operating expenses of \$5,550,331. This resulted in an operational gain of \$57,737 excluding the non-cash depreciation expense. Enrollment was up for the 20-21 fiscal year when compared to 19-20. The school was eligible for some COVID related grants and relief funds, which are reflected as income in our statement.

Scrip Gift Card Sales

Scrip sales were \$1,123,590 for the 2020-21 fiscal year. Total Scrip profit was \$35,280, after giving \$24,869 back to families in the form of a tuition credit, and \$3,589 back to clubs and parishes.

Scrip gift cards are a fundraising program where anyone can purchase over 80 different local and national business gift cards we have on inventory in our MACS Central Office. Thank you to the businesses and families who participate in this win/win program!

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee works to ensure that MACS is strategic about resource management in order to ensure quality education and a safe environment for the long term. Committee members are appointed by their Parish. The committee meets monthly to review financial results, the budget, and investments. In addition they discuss news and trends that may impact Catholic Education. Committee members include the parish representatives and the President, Controller and Business Manager at MACS.
